"Lord I Call..." Tone 1

Lord, I call upon Thee, <u>hear</u> me! <u>Hear</u> me, O Lord! <u>Lord</u>, I call upon Thee, <u>hear</u> me! Re<u>ceive</u> the <u>voice</u> of my prayer, when I <u>call</u> up<u>on</u> Thee!// Hear me, O Lord!

Let my <u>prayer</u> arise in Thy sight as <u>in</u>cense, and <u>let</u> the lifting <u>up</u> of my hands be an <u>eve</u>ning <u>sac</u>rifice!// <u>Hear me</u>, O Lord!

V. (10) Bring my soul out of prison, that I may give thanks to Your name!

Tone 1 *Idiomela (from the Pentecostarion, by John the Monk)*

The <u>doors</u> being shut and the Disciples as<u>sem</u>bled, You appeared to them as almighty, O <u>Je</u>sus our God. You <u>stood</u> in their midst, <u>giv</u>ing them peace, and granted the <u>Holy Spirit</u> to them, com<u>mand</u>ing them to wait in Je<u>ru</u>salem until they should be clothed with the <u>pow</u>er from on high. <u>There</u>fore we <u>cry</u> to You:// "O our Illumination and Resurrection and Peace, <u>glory</u> to You!"

V. (9) The righteous will surround me, for You will deal bountifully with me.

<u>Eight</u> days after Your Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Lord, You came to Your A<u>pos</u>tles pro<u>claim</u>ing: "<u>Peace</u> be with you all!" To the doubting Disciple, You <u>showed</u> Your <u>hands</u> and side. He be<u>lieved</u> and <u>cried</u> to You:// "My Lord and my God, <u>glo</u>ry to You!"

V. (8) Out of the depths I cry to You, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice!

<u>Thomas</u>, called the Twin, was not with the Disciples, O Christ, when You came to them through <u>closed</u> doors. <u>There</u>fore he <u>doubt</u>ed their word. You did not reject him for his <u>faith</u>lessness. When he <u>saw</u> Your side and the wounds in Your <u>hands</u> and feet, his faith was made <u>cer</u>tain. Having <u>touched</u> and <u>seen</u>, he confessed You to be truly <u>God</u>, not <u>only man</u>,// crying: "My Lord and my God, <u>glo</u>ry to You!"

V. (7) Let Your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!

The Disciples were assembled on the <u>eighth</u> day, and the Savior ap<u>peared</u> to them. He <u>gave</u> them peace and said to <u>Thom</u>as: "Come, O Apostle! Feel My <u>hands</u>, which were <u>pierced</u> by the nails!" O most <u>won</u>derful doubt of <u>Thom</u>as! It brought the hearts of the faithful to <u>know</u>ledge.// And with fear he cried: "My Lord and my God, <u>glory</u> to You!"

V. (6) If You, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with You.

Tone 2 Idiomela (from the Pentecostarion, by John the Monk)

After Your <u>rising</u>, O Lord, though the <u>doors</u> were shut, You <u>came</u> to your assembled Dis<u>ciples</u>, and <u>grant</u>ed them peace. Even Thomas believed, seeing Your <u>hands</u> and side; and he con<u>fessed</u> You as <u>Lord</u> and God,// Who save those who hope in You, O <u>Lov</u>er of man!

V. **(5)** For Your Name's sake I wait for You, O Lord. My soul has waited for Your word; my soul has hoped on the Lord.

When the <u>doors</u> were shut, Jesus stood in the midst of His Dis<u>ciples</u>. He <u>calmed</u> their hearts and <u>grant</u>ed them peace. Then He spoke to Apostle <u>Thom</u>as: "Do you not believe that I am <u>ris</u>en from the dead? Bring your <u>hands</u> here, and <u>touch</u> My side! Be no longer an unbe<u>liev</u>er! Proclaim My Passion and My Resur<u>rec</u>tion to all, that <u>eve</u>ryone may join in your cry:// 'My Lord and my <u>God</u>, <u>glo</u>ry to You!'"

V. (4) From the morning watch until night, from the morning watch, let Israel hope on the Lord!

Tone 4 (from the Menaion, for St. George) (Automelon – Model Melody)

As one valiant among the martyrs, O Great <u>Mar</u>tyr George, today we gather to <u>sing</u> your praise. You have <u>har</u>vested the wheat of <u>vir</u>tue; you have sown in tears and <u>reaped</u> in joy. You have finished the <u>race</u> and <u>kept</u> the faith; you have received from God the crown of <u>vic</u>tory. Pray for us to <u>Christ</u> our God that He may deliver us from cor<u>rup</u>tion and mis<u>for</u>tune// as we celebrate your noble memory in faith!

V. (3) For with the Lord there is mercy and with Him is plenteous redemption, and *He will deliver Israel from all his iniquities.*

You trusted with a <u>steady</u> mind and like a lion, went eagerly to the battle, O <u>glo</u>rious one. De<u>spis</u>ing the body as a cor<u>rupt</u>ible thing, instead you cared for your incor<u>rupt</u>ible soul. Like gold purified <u>sev</u>en <u>times</u> in the fire,// you were burned by many torments, O wise <u>Mar</u>tyr George.

V. (2) Praise the Lord, all nations! Praise Him, all peoples!

You suffered with the Savior, O <u>glo</u>rious one, united with His <u>death</u> by death. And you <u>reign</u> with Him in <u>splen</u>dor, arrayed in a robe dyed in the bright <u>pur</u>ple of your blood, adorned with the <u>scep</u>ter of your <u>suf</u>ferings, magnificent for eternity in the crown of <u>vic</u>tory,// O holy great <u>Mar</u>tyr George.

V. (1) For His mercy is confirmed on us, and the truth of the Lord endures forever.

You were armed with the <u>shield</u> of faith, the helmet of grace and the <u>spear</u> of the Cross. You were in<u>vin</u>cible to your adversaries, O <u>glo</u>rious George. As a champion of God, you conquered the hordes of <u>de</u>mons. Now you join the angelic choir, and, as the faithful <u>call</u> on you,// you help, sanctify and <u>save</u> them.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit;

Tone 6 *(from the Menaion, for St. George)*

As a tiller of the earth you deserved your name^{*}, O <u>war</u>rior George. By carrying on your shoulders the <u>Cross</u> of Christ, you have plowed the earth, barren through <u>Sa</u>tan's snares. The thorns of idolatry <u>held</u> it fast, but you planted it with the vine of true <u>faith</u> in Christ. You have brought healing for the faithful in <u>every</u> land. You have tended well the garden of the <u>Trin</u>ity. Pray for the well-<u>be</u>ing of the world// and the sal<u>va</u>tion of our souls!

now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 6 *(from the Pentecostarion, by John the Monk)*

When the doors were shut, Jesus came to His Dis<u>ciples</u>. The Apostle Thomas, by divine dispensation, was <u>not</u> with them, for he <u>spoke</u> these words:

"Unless I see the Master myself,

unless I see His side flowing with baptismal blood and <u>wa</u>ter, unless I see those wounds, which have <u>healed</u> all mankind, unless I see not a spirit, but flesh and bones, I will <u>not</u> believe." Glory to <u>You</u>, O Lord,

for You confirmed <u>Thom</u>as in faith,// and have trampled <u>death</u> by death!

Tone 4Idiomela(from the Pentecostarion)

O most glorious <u>won</u>der!

Doubt bore <u>cer</u>tain faith!

Thomas said: "Unless I see, I shall not believe!"

By touching His side, he blessed the incarnate Son of God, Who had <u>suf</u>fered in the flesh,

and he proclaimed the resur<u>rec</u>ted God,//

crying out with joy: "My Lord and my God, glory to You!"

V. Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem! Praise your God, O Zion! (Ps. 147:1)

O most glorious <u>won</u>der! Thomas placed his hand on the fiery side of Jesus <u>Christ</u> our God! <u>He</u> was not <u>scorched</u> by this, but his doubt changed to certain faith, and he cried <u>fer</u>vently: "You are my <u>Mas</u>ter <u>and</u> my God.// Glory to You, Who are <u>risen</u> from the dead!"

V. For He strengthens the bars of your gates; He blesses your children within you! (*Ps.* 147:2)

O most glorious wonder!

John the Apostle leaned on the Savior's breast,

and <u>Thom</u>as was made worthy to <u>touch</u> His side.

The one thus understood the depths of the<u>ol</u>ogy,

while the other was privileged to announce the mystery of the Resur<u>rec</u>tion to us,//

crying: "My Lord and my God, glory to You!"

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit;

Tone 4 *(from the Menaion, for St. George, by the Studite)*

Come, brethren, let us praise in <u>spir</u>itual songs the ever-memorable <u>Mar</u>tyr George! His en<u>dur</u>ance was harder than <u>diamond</u>; he fervently declared him<u>self</u> for Christ! He faced dangers and <u>bore</u> with <u>hard</u>ships, hardening his perishable body to suffer <u>tor</u>ment! His love overcame earthly <u>na</u>ture, enabling the lover to <u>reach</u> his Be<u>lov</u>ed through death:// Christ our God, the Savior of our souls! now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 5 *(from the Pentecostarion)*

How <u>great</u> is the abundance of Your compassion, O <u>Lov</u>er of man! Because of Your long-suffering, You were <u>struck</u> by the Jews, You were ex<u>amined</u> by an Apostle and touched by those who de<u>nied</u> You. <u>How</u> are You in<u>carnate</u>? How are You <u>cru</u>cified, For <u>You</u> have <u>not</u> known sin! Make <u>us</u> understand like <u>Thom</u>as, that we may call <u>out</u> to You:// "My Lord and my <u>God</u>, <u>glo</u>ry to You!"

(at Great Vespers)

Tone 4 Troparion (*St. George*)

As a martyr of Christ, you were bound for good <u>deeds</u>, O George, by faith you conquered the torturer's <u>god</u>lessness. You were offered as a sacrifice <u>pleasing</u> to God; thus receiving the crown of <u>vic</u>tory.// Through your intercessions, forgiveness of sins is granted to all.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 7Troparion (Pentecostarion)

From the <u>sealed</u> tomb, You shone forth, O <u>Life</u>! Through closed doors You came to Your Disciples, O <u>Christ</u> God. Re<u>new</u> in us, through them, an upright <u>spir</u>it,// by the greatness of Your <u>mer</u>cy, O Resur<u>rec</u>tion of all! (at the Divine Liturgy)

Tone 7Troparion(Pentecostarion)

From the <u>sealed</u> tomb, You shone forth, O <u>Life</u>! Through closed doors You came to Your Disciples, O <u>Christ</u> God. Re<u>new</u> in us, through them, an upright <u>spir</u>it,// by the greatness of Your <u>mer</u>cy, O Resur<u>rec</u>tion of all!

Tone 4 Troparion (*St. George*)

As a martyr of Christ, thou wast bound for good <u>deeds</u>, O George; by faith thou didst conquer the torturer's <u>god</u>lessness. Thou wast offered as a sacrifice <u>pleasing</u> to God, thus receiving the crown of <u>vic</u>tory. // Through thine intercessions, forgiveness of sins is granted to all.

Tone 4 Kontakion (*St. George*)

God raised thee as His own <u>gar</u>dener, O George, for thou hast gathered for thyself the sheaves of <u>vir</u>tue. Having sown in tears, thou dost now <u>reap</u> with joy; thou hast shed thy blood in combat and won <u>Christ</u> as thy crown.// Through thine intercessions, forgiveness of sins is <u>grant</u>ed to all.

Tone 8Kontakion (Pentecostarion)

Thomas <u>touched</u> Your <u>life-giving side</u> with an eager hand, O <u>Christ</u> God, when You <u>came</u> to <u>Your</u> Apostles through <u>closed</u> doors.// He cried <u>out</u> with <u>all</u>: "You <u>are</u> my <u>Lord</u> and my God!"

(The Trisagion is sung)

Tone 3Prokeimenon(from the Pentecostarion)

Great is our Lord, and abundant in power, / His understanding is beyond measure. (*Ps.* 146:5)

V. Praise the Lord! For it is good to sing praises to our God! (Ps. 146:1)

Tone 7Prokeimenon(St. George)

The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord / and shall hope in Him. (Ps. 63:11a)

Epistle (14) Acts 5:12-20 (29) Acts 12:1-11 *(St. George)*

Tone 8 Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

V. Come, let us rejoice in the Lord! Let us make a joyful noise to God our *Savior*! (*Ps.* 94:1)

V. For the Lord is a great God, and a great King over all the earth. (*Ps.* 94:3) **Tone 4**

V. The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a cedar in Lebanon. (Ps. 91:11)

Gospel (65) John 20:19-31 (52) John 15:17-16:2 (*St. George*)

(Instead of "It is truly meet...," we sing: The Angel cried ...)

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord, O Jerusalem! Praise your God, O Zion! (*Ps.* 147:1) The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance! He shall not fear evil tidings! (*Ps.* 111:6) Alleluia, Alleluia!

At the Dismissal, the Priest says: "Glory to You, O Christ..." and the choir sings "Christ is risen from the dead..." (thrice).

And unto us He has given eternal life. Let us worship His Resurrection on the third day!
