V. (1) For His mercy is confirmed on us, and the truth of the Lord endures forever.

Tone 1 *Idiomela* (by Patriarch Germanos)

What shall we call you, O <u>Proph</u>et? Angel, apostle, <u>mar</u>tyr? <u>Angel</u>, for you have spent your life like those who have no <u>body</u>. Apostle, for you have <u>taught</u> the <u>nations</u>, and <u>mar</u>tyr, for your head has been cut off for the <u>sake</u> of Christ.// Pray to Him then that our souls may be granted great <u>mer</u>cy!

Let us <u>cel</u>ebrate the memorial of the beheading of the <u>Fore</u>runner; at that time you gushed forth blood upon the <u>plat</u>ter,// and now you pour forth healing to the <u>ends</u> of the earth!

To<u>day</u> the mother of <u>mur</u>der, acting with more wickedness than has <u>ev</u>er been seen, has roused to <u>ev</u>il her utterly wanton <u>daughter</u> against the divinely-chosen and greatest of <u>all</u> the <u>Proph</u>ets. For while hateful <u>Her</u>od was celebrating his ungodly <u>birth</u>day, she contrived according to the oath he had given her for her <u>dancing</u>, to <u>beg</u> for the precious head of the <u>her</u>ald of God that <u>gushed</u> forth <u>mir</u>acles.

And <u>he</u>, in his madness, fulfilled his <u>promise</u> and gave it to her as reward for her brazen <u>dancing</u>.

But the in<u>it</u>iate of the <u>com</u>ing of Christ

ceased not after death to rebuke them for their repulsive union,

but reproved them loudly, saying:

"It does not become you to commit adultery with the wife of your brother <a href="Philip." Philip.""

Oh, birthday, killer of prophets!

Oh, banquet full of blood!

Let <u>us</u>, arrayed in white, piously celebrate the Beheading of the <u>Fore</u>runner, and rejoice on this day as on a <u>great</u> feast!

And let us <u>ask</u> the Forerunner to beseech the <u>Trin</u>ity for us,//

that we be delivered from dishonorable passions, and that our souls be saved!

Tone 4

Herod's birthday celebration was a lawless and shameful feast,

for, spellbound by feminine licentiousness

and stricken with madness by a woman's wantonness,

he cut off the head of the Forerunner;

but he did not cut out the Prophet's tongue, which had de<u>nounced</u> his foolishness.

but let us join in celebrating with love the blessed slaying of John the <u>Bap</u>tist; for he was in hell in antici<u>pa</u>tion

Tone 5 (*Theotokion, from the Dormition*)

<u>Sing</u>, O people! Sing the praises of the <u>Mother of our God</u>; for today she delivers her <u>soul</u>, full of light, into the <u>hands</u> of Him Who became incarnate of her with<u>out</u> seed. And she en<u>treats</u> Him without <u>ceasing</u>// to grant the earth <u>peace</u> and great <u>mer</u>cy.

Tone 2 Idiomela

O Baptist John, preacher of repentance, when your head was cut off, you sanctified the earth; for you made clear God's Law to the faithful destroying lawlessness.

As you stand before the throne of the heavenly King,//entreat Him to have mercy on our souls!

V. The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a cedar in Lebanon. (Ps. 91:11)

O most <u>ho</u>ly John, you were beheaded for the sake of the <u>Law</u> of the Lord. <u>Filled</u> with <u>bold</u>ness of speech, you rebuked the evil king for his trans<u>gres</u>sion of the Law. The host of Angels <u>mar</u>vel at your strength; the choir of A<u>pos</u>tles and Martyrs <u>praise</u> you. We also celebrate your yearly commemo<u>ra</u>tion,//glorifying the Holy Trinity Who crowned you, O most blessed <u>Fore</u>runner.

V. The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord and shall hope in Him. (Ps. 63:11a)

The Prophet from among the <u>Proph</u>ets, and greater than all the <u>Proph</u>ets, <u>sanc</u>tified from his mother's womb to the Lord's <u>ser</u>vice, today has been beheaded by a <u>law</u>less king; and openly rebuking the woman who danced im<u>mod</u>estly, both be<u>fore</u> and after his be<u>heading</u>, he put shame upon that sinful <u>gath</u>ering. Thus, we cry out: "O <u>Bap</u>tist John,// as you have boldness to speak, intercede on be<u>half</u> of our souls!"

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit;

Tone 8

O <u>Fore</u>runner of the <u>Sav</u>ior, you rebuked kings so that they would not work in<u>iq</u>uity; but the frolicking of a lawless woman persuaded <u>Her</u>od to cut <u>off</u> your head. Therefore we bless your name from the rising to the <u>set</u>ting of the sun. Since you stand with <u>bold</u>ness before the Lord,// earnestly entreat Him to save our souls!

Tone 8 (*Theotokion*)

O un<u>wed</u>ded <u>Virgin</u>, who ineffably conceived <u>God</u> in the flesh, O <u>Mother of God</u> most high, accept the cries of your servants, O <u>blame</u>less One! Grant cleansing of trans<u>gres</u>sions to all!// Receive our prayers and pray to <u>save</u> our souls!

Tone 2 Troparion

The <u>mem</u>ory of the righteous is celebrated with <u>hymns</u> of praise, but the Lord's testimony is sufficient for you, O <u>Fore</u>runner.

You were <u>shown</u> in truth to be the most honorable of the <u>Proph</u>ets, for you were deemed worthy to baptize in the streams of the Jordan <u>Him</u> Whom they foretold.

<u>There</u>fore, having suffered for the <u>truth</u> with joy, you proclaimed to those in hell God Who ap<u>peared</u> in the flesh, Who <u>takes</u> away the <u>sin</u> of the world// and grants us <u>great mercy</u>. (thrice)

(at the Divine Liturgy)

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Tone 5 Kontakion

The <u>glo</u>rious beheading of the <u>Fore</u>runner became an act of divine dispen<u>sation</u>, for he <u>preached</u> to those in hell the coming of the <u>Sav</u>ior. Let <u>Hero</u>dias lament, for she entreated lawless <u>mur</u>der, loving not the Law of God, nor <u>eternal life</u>,// but that which is <u>false</u> and <u>temporal</u>.

The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord / and shall hope in Him. (Ps. 63:11a)
