Fifth Monday of Great Lent: Apostles of the Seventy: Aristarchus, Pudens, and Trophimus, Vespers (sung on Sunday)

#### "Lord I Call..." Tone 4

Lord, I call upon You, <u>hear</u> me! <u>Hear</u> me, O Lord! <u>Lord</u>, I call upon You, <u>hear</u> me! Receive the <u>voice</u> of my prayer, when I <u>call</u> up<u>on</u> You!// Hear me, O Lord!

Let my <u>prayer</u> arise in Your sight as <u>in</u>cense, and <u>let</u> the lifting <u>up</u> of my hands be an evening <u>sac</u>rifice!// <u>Hear me</u>, O Lord!

**V.** (10) Bring my soul out of prison, that I may give thanks to Your Name!

## **Tone 4**\* (Penitential stichera in the Tone of the week)

Lord, I long to wash away with tears the record of <u>all</u> my sins, and to spend the remaining <u>days</u> of my life <u>pleasing</u> You through repentance, but the Enemy continually deceives me. He wages <u>war</u> against my soul.//
Save me before I completely <u>per</u>ish, O Lord!

V. (9) The righteous will surround me, for You will deal bountifully with me.

Who, when caught in a storm, if he runs to this <u>haven</u> is not saved? Or who that is sick, if he runs to this healing, is <u>not</u> made whole? O Creator of all and Physician of the sick,//
Save me before I completely <u>perish</u>, O Lord!

V. (8) Out of the depths I cry to You, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice!

Wash me in my tears, O <u>Sav</u>ior, for I am defiled by <u>many</u> sins! <u>There</u>fore I fall be<u>fore</u> You:// I have sinned; have mercy on me, O God!

**V**. (7) Let Your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!

I, a sheep of Your <u>ra</u>tional flock, flee for refuge to You, the Good <u>Shep</u>herd. O <u>God</u>, I have <u>gone</u> astray;// seek me, and have <u>mer</u>cy on me!

**V.** (6) If You, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with You.

**Tone 3**<sup>†</sup> (from the Lenten Triodion, by Joseph) (Great is the power)

In this season of abstinence, O be<u>liev</u>ers, let us exert every <u>ef</u>fort, that we may attain great glory, escaping the <u>fire</u> of hell,// by the mercy of <u>God</u>, the <u>great</u> King!

**V.** (5) For Your Name's sake I wait for You, O Lord. My soul has waited for Your word; my soul has hoped on the Lord.

Having passed the middle point of this <u>ho</u>ly Fast, let us clearly show forth the beginning of divine <u>glo</u>ry! Let us fervently hasten to the achievement of good be<u>hav</u>ior,//that we may receive the eternal joy!

V. (4) From the morning watch until night, from the morning watch, let Israel hope on the Lord!

**Tone 7** (from the Lenten Triodion, by Theodore)

Having <u>passed</u> beyond the middle point of this <u>holy</u> Fast, let us <u>strive</u> to its end, rejoicing with <u>steadfastness!</u>
Let us a<u>noint</u> ourselves with the oil of <u>char</u>ity, that we may be <u>worthy</u> to adore the noble Passion of <u>Christ</u> our God,// and attain His most honored and <u>holy</u> Resur<u>rec</u>tion!

**V.** (3) For with the Lord there is mercy and with Him is plenteous redemption, and He will deliver Israel from all his iniquities.

### **Tone 1** (from the Menaion, for the Apostles) (O all-praised martyrs)

By your <u>preaching</u> filled with divine under<u>standing</u>, you delivered the people from <u>ig</u>norance.

O most <u>wise</u> Apostles, and you <u>led</u> them, <u>saved</u>, to the Word,

Who shone <u>forth</u> from the unbegotten <u>Fa</u>ther.//
Entreat Him that He may grant our souls peace and great <u>mercy!</u>

V. (2) Praise the Lord, all nations! Praise Him, all peoples!

Let us <u>openly</u> praise the true <u>preachers</u> of Christ: Púdens, Aristárchus and the divine Tro<u>phí</u>mus, for with the <u>warmth</u> of di<u>vine</u> grace they brought the <u>win</u>ter of <u>false</u>hood to an end. <u>Now</u> they have made their abode in the never <u>fad</u>ing Light, receiving the reward of their <u>la</u>bors,// and are deified through ineffable com<u>mun</u>ion.

**V.** (1) For His mercy is confirmed on us, and the truth of the Lord endures forever.

You <u>fol</u>lowed Paul, the glorious dis<u>ci</u>ple and endured many tribulations, O <u>glo</u>rious ones, you were im<u>pri</u>soned with chains and subjected to <u>tor</u>ture, and finally you were be<u>headed by</u> the sword.//
Entreat Christ that He may grant our souls peace and great <u>mer</u>cy!

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

#### **Tone 1** (*Theotokion*)

Woe is <u>me! What</u> shall I do? I have defiled my mind, soul, and body with transgressions. What shall I do? How shall I escape the un<u>bearable</u> flame, and the unbreakable and <u>ev</u>er<u>last</u>ing bonds?// Yet grant me remission of my sins before the end, O most pure one!

#### **Tone 8** Great Prokeimenon

Turn not away Your face from Your child, for I am afflicted: / hear me speedily, draw near unto my soul, and deliver it! (Ps. 68:21-22a)

- V. Let Your salvation, O God, uphold me! (Ps. 68:34b)
- V. Let the poor see and be glad! (Ps. 68:37a)
- V. Seek God, and your soul shall live! (Ps. 68:37b)

## **Tone 7** *Idiomelon (from the Lenten Triodion)*

The <u>Sav</u>ior Who planted the vineyard and called the laborers is <u>near</u> indeed. <u>Come</u>, therefore, O <u>work</u>ers in the Fast: let us re<u>ceive</u> our wages, for the Giver is rich and <u>mer</u>ciful!// Even if we have labored little we re<u>ceive</u> great <u>mer</u>cy.

**V**. I lift up mine eyes to You, enthroned in the heavens! Behold, as the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of a maid to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the Lord our God, till He have mercy upon us. (Ps 122:1-2)

### **Tone 6** *Idiomelon (from the Lenten Triodion, by Stephen)*

When Adam fell among the <u>rob</u>bers of thought, he was <u>robbed</u> of his mind; his soul was wounded, and he was cast out naked and with<u>out</u> any aid. The priest who came before the Law did not <u>lis</u>ten to him. The Levite who came after the Law had no com<u>passion</u> on him: only You, O God, Who came not from Samaria but from the Theo<u>to</u>kos!//O Lord, <u>glo</u>ry to You!

**V**. Have mercy upon us, O Lord, have mercy upon us, for we have had more than enough of contempt. Too long our soul has been sated with the scorn of those who are at ease, the contempt of the proud. (Ps. 122:3-4)

# **Tone 6** *(for the Martyrs)*

Your <u>mar</u>tyrs, O Lord, did not de<u>ny</u> You, nor did they forsake Your com<u>mand</u>ments.// By their intercessions, have <u>mer</u>cy on us!

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

### **Tone 6** *(from the Lenten Triodion)*

Like the Archangel, O be<u>liev</u>ers, let us praise the heavenly Bridal Chamber and the <u>well</u>-sealed Gate! "Rejoice, O <u>La</u>dy, through whom sprang forth for us the <u>Sav</u>ior, Christ, the Life-giver and <u>God</u> of all! Undefiled hope of Christians, destroy with your <u>own</u> hands// the tyrants, our godless <u>en</u>emies!

#### **Tone 8** The Lenten Troparia

Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos, Mary, full of grace: the <u>Lord</u> is with you. Blessed are <u>you</u> among women, and blessed is the Fruit of your <u>womb</u>;// for you have borne the <u>Sav</u>ior of our souls.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit,

O <u>Bap</u>tiser of Christ, remember us <u>all</u>, that we may be de<u>liv</u>ered from our in<u>iq</u>uities;// for to you is given grace to inter<u>cede</u> for us!

Now and <u>ev</u>er, and unto ages of <u>ages</u>. Amen.

Inter<u>cede</u> for us, O holy Apostles and all the <u>saints</u>, that we may be de<u>liv</u>ered from perils and <u>sor</u>rows;// for we have acquired you as fervent intercessors before the <u>Sav</u>ior!

Be<u>neath</u> your compassion we take refuge, O Theo<u>to</u>kos. Do not de<u>spise</u> our supplications in ad<u>ver</u>sity,// but deliver us from perils, O only pure and only <u>bless</u>ed one!
